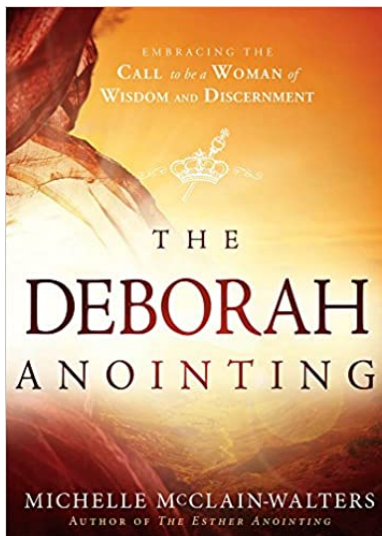




The Deborah Anointing
